# STUDENT SUCCESS STORY Moises Arreola

I am Moises Arreola, a recent graduate of Lake Forest College with a degree in Computer Science. I am now a Software Developer at Medline working on their Al/Automation team.

Waukegan to College single-handedly changed the trajectory of my life. We moved to Waukegan from Chicago to be close to family in the area. My parents wanted a better future for us kids and they moved to the US for that sole purpose.

Right before I started high school, Waukegan High School hosted an open house. My mom stopped by the Waukegan to College table, and although she is not very good in English, she does understand the word "college". She talked to the representatives who spoke Spanish and took almost every single form on the table. She gave me the program application and, even though I was shy and didn't want to do it, I applied. I got in!

Waukegan to College isn't just a college readiness program where you drop off your kid and they turn you into a college student. It really is a relationship between the student, the parent, and the advisor. It's like a "triangle of trust".

My Waukegan to College tutor taught me to love math, and now I am a math tutor to help others who struggle like I did. My parents participated in Waukegan to College programs designed for families about the college journey. And my career advisor at Waukegan to College helped me build my application package and choose colleges.

If my mom had not seen the Waukegan to College sign and picked up an application for me, I would never have realized my dream, and my parents' dream, for a better future through a college degree.



#### What do we look for in a student for optimal success?

**Hope, Hunger, and Hustle:** We begin working with students as early as the 5th grade. After they complete our application and are selected via interviews, our team and programs guide them as they shape their trajectory for success every step of the way.

Our innovative, hands-on learning experiences spark curiosity, build critical thinking, and connect academics to the real world. From cooking math-infused recipes to coding, solving mysteries, and building canoes, our students apply what they learn in creative and memorable ways that inspire them and prepare them for success in high school, college, and career.

# Our Programs are Designed to Meet Needs and Spark Curiosity

Our programs—built on a partnership with scholars, their families, and community members—are uniquely designed for first-generation college success. No matter where a student starts on the journey to and through college, we have the resources to make the process accessible, efficient, and effective.

#### For 5th through 8th Graders: Skyrocket

A summer program, which helps to close the learning gap, blends math, reading, writing, and active listening through creative, hands-on themes like "Shark Tank" and "Master Chef Jr." Students practice academic skills while designing, pitching, and creating ideas in a fun, collaborative environment.

# For High Schoolers: Urban Wilderness Boat Build Program (in collaboration with Lake Forest Open Lands)


Students apply STEM concepts to design and build a functional canoe. From measuring and geometry to engineering and buoyancy, they use teamwork and problem-solving to turn classroom lessons into a real-world achievement, then test their creation on the middle fork of the North branch of the Chicago River.

#### For College Students:

The support doesn't stop once they get on a college campus. In partnership with UtmostU, college students keep in touch with their advisor regularly, have access to funds for emergencies or opportunities like unpaid internships, and referrals for mental health issues.

#### **Key Partnerships Add Value to Learning and Experiences**

With Compudopt and LEAP Innovations Learning Network, 14 middle school students and 16 high school students were awarded laptops for school and program use, and over 40 students gained experience in public speaking and building their personal brand.




# **Excellent Academic Performance**

Of the students who participated in tutoring, 95% of middle school students maintained or improved their grades to As or Bs in English, 84% in Math; 78% of high school students maintained or improved their grades to As and Bs in English, 90% in Math.

#### **Parent Involvement Enhances Family Attention and Support**

Parents and caregivers are deeply engaged, with 92% attending monthly advising sessions led by our experienced parent educator team. They join college visits, participate in Expanding Horizons programs, and take part in financial aid reviews and college selection discussions—gaining firsthand insight into their children's opportunities and choices.



#### Holistic Student Support Builds a Stronger Foundation

Student-informed changes to the Supporting the Whole Student program produced significant outcomes: 85% of students reported highly positive emotions (less stressed, happy, calm, relaxed, energized) after exploring nature. After our Summer "Destress Fest" Send-Off during final exam week, 96% reported highly positive emotions, including feeling more connected with others.

# Staff, Volunteers, and the Community Empower Students' Dreams

Zari has been mentoring Nailah, a senior at Waukegan High School, since 2024. Zari was born and raised in Waukegan. She attended the Waukegan to College end-of-year celebration for seniors heading off to college:

"I didn't even know half of the students there, but I was so proud of every single one of them. Coming from our area, I know how hard it can be to get that opportunity, especially if your family struggles financially. Many of these students were first generation, and they weren't just doing this for themselves, they were doing it for their families, too. It reminded me so much of my own story, how my parents sacrificed for me, and how proud I felt walking across that stage with my degrees. Seeing those students have that same moment made me emotional, and it reminded me exactly why I mentor."

Melissa, a volunteer essay coach, helps guide students in crafting their personal statements for their college applications. Here is why she keeps coming back:

"As an essay coach/college support, I have really enjoyed the role I play in helping Waukegan to College students achieve their goal of attending college. The biggest win for me is when a student feels empowered to share their story with confidence and authenticity which keeps me coming back year after year."

One of our key success indicators is helping students secure scholarships, aiming to keep their annual out-of-pocket costs as low as possible. This year, 75% of our rising freshman college students met our goal of \$3,500 or less.
